
Varndoe Cave

Once again, the two Grottos joined forces for an epic trip to an Alabama cave. Members from both Montgomery and Cullman came together on a cold morning in Huntsville to explore the depths of Varndoe Cave.

This cave is fun multi drop trip that doesn't require a wet suit. The drops are close together so there isn't a lot of traversing with a boat load of gear. With the longest drop around 100' or so a lot of rope isn't required. This is a trip that newer vertically proficient cavers can go on due to all of the drops are easy to navigate.

The hike to this gem covers the spectrum. It starts out in a neighborhood walking down the sidewalk but then enters the tree line and is probably more challenging than the cave. It is down a bluff side that is slippery and rocky. The hike isn't that long compared to other TAG caves.



There are a couple of entrances you can take but we chose the easier one. Our group was made up of seasoned and new cavers. A total of 9 cavers made the journey. With this many we opted to sort of spread out and not have a lot of people waiting at the drops.

After reaching the bottom of the last drop the smaller cavers can navigate a long canyon section that ends up in some dome rooms with some formations. A few of our group decided to make this trek while the others started climbing out. Everyone made it out and we derigged as we went. The group made the hike out and the majority made it to a local eatery to end the trip.



We all made it to the bottom and started looking around at the formations that make this trip well worth the effort. We poked around and climbed up to see new stuff at every turn. We then started our way out. As a couple of us climbed, others still poked around to see what else they could find. This cave still holds surprises around each corner.

Going out is somewhat slower due to the fact you have to de-rig everything, and that takes some time. We slowly made our way out, pulling ropes and bags at each drop. Finally, we emerged from the depths to a nice day. We made our way back to the parking area and then to find a Mexican restaurant to finish the trip right.

March – Grotto Vertical Practice – Camp Hulaco





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


Trip Report
Montgomery Gypsum Cave - Texas

We left our home in Austin, TX at 4pm and arrived in San Antonio at 5:30. We^{re} some members of the San Antonio Grotto at Lee High School. The man heading the trip was Joe Joy, a professional speleologist that we met at the Texas Cavers Reunion last fall. Accompanying Joe was his wife, Linda, another 5.4 grotto member named Gary, 3 high school teachers (2 male, 1 female) and 6 members of a group known as the Junior Explorers.

We left San Antonio at about 7pm after stopping for a quick bite at Taco Cabana (like Taco Bell, but better!). We stopped again in Hondo, TX for a gas stop & some snacks. From there, we continued on to Brackettville, TX (you know - where the convention was last year). Then, it was on to Del Rio (about 2-3 miles from the Mexican border). The next town we drove through was Langtry (home of Judge Roy Bean - "the only law west of the Pecos!"). Everything came to an abrupt halt here, as we were stopped by the U.S. Border Patrol looking for illegal aliens.
